Boats Lost



Tolling of the Boats for January

USS Scorpion (SS-278)

Lost on Jan 5,1944 with the loss of 77 officers and men in the East China Sea, on her 4th war patrol. It is assumed she was sunk by a mine.

USS Argonaut (SS-166)

Lost on Jan 10, 1943 with the loss of 102 officers and men off Rabaul, on her 3rd war patrol. While attacking a convoy, she torpedoed a Jap destroyer who along with 2 other destroyers depth charged her. As she tried to surface, the destroyers sunk her by gun fire.

USS Swordfish (SS-193)

Lost on Jan 12,1945 with the loss of 89 officers and men somewhere near Okinawa, on her 13th war patrol. Probably was lost to a mine.

USS S-36 (SS-141)

Lost on Jan 20, 1942 with no loss of life, on her 2nd war patrol. She ran hard aground on a reef and radioed for help. The entire crew was rescued by a Dutch ship after they scuttled her.

USS S-26 (SS-131)

Lost on Jan 24,1942 with the loss of 46 officers and men in the Gulf of Panama, on her 2nd war patrol. She was rammed by the USS PC-460 and sunk within seconds. The CO, XO and one lookout on the bridge, were the only survivors.

REQUIN BASE CANDY PROGRAM

The candy comes from Daffin's in boxes of 36 bars and the selling cost is \$1.00 per bar (which is a steal). The candy bars consist of Milk Chocolate, Crunchy, Peanut Butter, Almond, Carmel, Pretzel and Dark Chocolate. We can make up a box of assorted bars.

We made up a special wrapper for the candy. It has our challenge coin and a picture of the Requin Submarine on it. It relates to everyone that this is the only veterans candy bar they will find in the tri-state area.

The program is set up this way – the member who orders the candy, pays \$36.00 up front. Then to recoup his money, he sells the 36 bars. This way it does not cost him a penny. The \$36.00 per box is divided - \$18.00 is given to the candy company and the other goes to the base. The member decides which base activity that he wants the candy profit (\$18.00 to go – Kap(ss)4Kid(ss), Eagle Scouts, Base Memorial Fund, Idaho support Fund, or the General fund. January 16, 2021 American Legion Baden, PA & Zoom

Requin History: Launched January 1, 1945. January 20, 1948 given hull classification OSSR-481 and modified to the Migrain II radar picket configuration. January 15, 1951 entered Mediterranean until May when she returned to normal operations on the US east coast and in the Caribbean. January 1, 1953 maintained her schedule of Second and Sixth Fleet operations but at the end of the year put into Philadelphia PA for extensive modernization overhaul that among other things removed her last remaining anti-aircraft cannon.

Base Commander Huey Dietrich: Let us at this time, with a moment of silent prayer, remember our Shipmates who made the supreme sacrifice that we may gather here in Peace. We dedicate this meeting to our Shipmates on Eternal Patrol, to perpetuate their memories in our lives and to honor our Shipmates on active duty in the service of the first line of defense of our Nation.

This month in US submarine history

01/01/1943

USS Nautilus (SS 168) evacuated 29 civilians from Teop Island, Solomons. Also on this date, USS Porpoise (SS 172) attacked a Japanese convoy and sank the freighter Renzan Maru off northeastern coast of Honshu, Japan.

01/01/1944

USS Ray (SS 271) sinks a Japanese gunboat at the mouth of Ambon Bay, while USS Puffer (SS 268) attacks a Japanese convoy at the western entrance of the Mindanao Sea, sinking an army cargo ship. On the same day USS Herring (SS 233) attacks a Japanese convoy, sinking an aircraft transport ship 220 miles off Tokyo Bay.

01/02/1943

USS Argonaut (SM1) sinks the Japanese guard boat Ebon Maru in the Bismarck Sea.

01/02/1944

USS Finback (SS 230) sinks a Japanese merchant tanker in the East China Sea.

01/03/1909

USS Scorpion arrives to help the survivors of the Messina, Sicily earthquake. With the Great White Fleet making its way through the Suez Canal, President T. Roosevelt orders the U.S. Navy to assist.

01/03/1945

USS Kingfish (SS 234) attacks a Japanese convoy in the Bonin Islands sinking a Japanese army cargo ship and two freighters 200 miles north of Chichi Jima.

01/04/1943

USS Shad (SS 235) sinks German minesweeper M 4242 (ex-French trawler Odet II) in the Bay of Biscay.

01/04/1944

USS Bluefish (SS 222) and USS Rasher (SS 269) attack a Japanese convoy off French Indochina; Bluefish sinks a merchant tanker while Rasher damages another tanker. Also on this date USS Cabrilla (SS 288) sinks a Japanese freighter off Cape Padran, French Indochina while USS Tautog (SS 109) sinks a Japanese freighter off southern Honshu.

01/07/1945

Submarine Spot (SS 413) sinks the Japanese gunboat No.2 Nichiei Maru in the Inland Sea.

01/08/1983

Fast Attack Submarine USS City of Corpus Christi (SSN 705) is commissioned.

01/08/1994

Fast Attack Submarine USS Santa Fe (SSN 763) is commissioned.

01/09/1942

Submarine USS Pollack (SS 180) sinks the Japanese freighter Teian Maru (ex-Yugoslav Tomislav) 40 miles south-southwest of Inubo Saki, Japan.

01/09/1959

Non-strategic submarine Halibut (SSGN 587), launches. Redesignated an attack submarine in 1965, she serves until decommissioned in 1986.

01/09/1993

Fast Attack Submarine USS Springfield (SSN 761) is commissioned.

01/10/1943

Submarine Trigger (SS 237) sinks the Japanese destroyer Okikaze off Yokosuka, Japan.

01/101944

Submarines Seawolf (SS 197) and Steelhead (SS 280) attack a Japanese convoy about 70 miles north of Naha, Okinawa, sinking three ships, including one while in the middle of a typhoon.

01/12/1943

Submarine Guardfish (SS 217) sinks Japanese Patrol Boat No.1 about 10 miles southwest of the Tingwon Islands, located just southwest of the northern tip of New Hanover, Bismarck Archipelago.

01/14/1943

USS Gudgeon (SS 211) lands six men, 2,000 pounds of equipment and supplies on Negros Island for first resupply mission for a submarine.

01/14/1944

Five U.S. Navy submarines sink five different Japanese vessels in and around the Pacific Ocean. USS Albacore (SS 218) sinks Japanese destroyer Sazanami 300 miles off Yap; USS Scamp (SS 277) sinks the tanker Nippon Maru off Sorol Island; USS Guardfish (SS 217) sinks tanker Kenyo Maru southeast of Palau; USS Seawolf (SS 197) sinks tanker Yamazuru Maru off Okinawa, and USS Swordfish (SS 193) sinks transport Yamakuni Maru off Hachijo Jima.

USS Cobia (SS 245) sinks the Japanese minelayer Yurijima off the east coast of Malaya.

The submarine E-2 explodes at the New York Navy Yard because of escaping gases during an overhaul. The interior ship is severely damaged and four men are killed.

Submarine USS Whale (SS 239) sinks the Japanese transport Heiyo Maru.



New documents show doomed USS Thresher submarine lacked training, preparations

The sinking of the RMS Titanic in 1912. The explosion of the Space Shuttle Challenger in 1986. And the implosion of the USS Thresher submarine in 1963.

All were tragedies. But a retired Navy captain believes it's time for further scrutiny of the disaster that's least-known of the three.

"This was a significant historical event," Jim Bryant says of the day Thresher went down. "It needs to be understood."

The deadliest submarine accident ever sent 129 sailors and civilians to their deaths off the coast of Massachusetts. And only now, 57 years later, Bryant has finally received and reviewed a batch of Navy documents never before seen by the public.

Bryant, a 23-year Navy veteran who himself commanded a Thresher-class submarine, the USS Guard-

fish, has been litigating for more records to be released for years. His successful suit against the Navy will ultimately bring to light some 3,600 pages of never-released documents about what happened to the submarine on April 10, 1963, a federal judge in Washington D.C. ruled in February 2020.

The Thresher's fateful plunge came somewhere around 1,300 feet of depth, when its nuclear reactor shut down. The hull imploded despite efforts by the crew to blow its ballast tanks. Its remains weren't found until more than a year later, and the boat is never to be decommissioned, its sailors forever on "eternal patrol."

An official investigation following the sinking found a failed seawater pipe to be the cause. But the new documents cast light on other problems — notably, that the new submarine was rushed and underprepared for the challenges it faced at ever greater depths. Workers from the Portsmouth Naval Shipyard were still aboard working out the kinks as submariners also tried to train, all the while on a new, differently configured and heavier sub loaded with fresh technology.

"They really needed more time," said Bryant, who worked with a team of retired Navy and submarine experts to comb the new documents.

Only 19 pages of a total 1,700 investigative documents had been released publically before Bryant and his team sued to bring more of them to light. In September, in their successful suit, the first 300 pages were released, followed by another 1,200.

'Understanding the mindset'

Bryant, a San Diego resident now in his 70s, said he'd always expected the documents to surface pieces of the puzzle, but he never anticipated any shocking revelation.

"We did not ever expect to find a smoking gun or government coverup," Bryant said. "What we wanted to find out was what the hell these people were thinking."

Bryant has argued throughout the lawsuit that the release of records will help current and future sailors, engineers and others understand "the mindset" of what led to the Thresher disaster. In this case, it appears to have been a lack of preparation for what was the Navy's most advanced sub of its time.

"The dangers of almost doubling the total depth were not appreciated and the fabrication, repair, and quality assurance were not improved fast enough or applied with enough force to prevent this disaster," Bryant wrote in his report on the released documents. "The operating procedures were not in place to recover the submarine at or near total depth after a loss of propulsion and after it became negatively buoyant with minor flooding or excess leakage. Crew training was insufficient."

The testimonies before the Navy Court of Inquiry, which conducted the investigation in the aftermath of the sinking, included that of Cmdr. John Woolston, then project officer that oversaw the Navy's leap from the Skipjack class to the Thresher class of submarines. Thresher was 14% larger, bigger in diameter, and longer. A superior sonar dome at the bow of Thresher, today standard on subs, relocated its torpedo tubs further aft. And while it hasn't been officially released, Bryant said it's widely known Thresher went to nearly double the depths of its predecessors: at least 1,300 feet.

The boat also was not as good at "deballasting" water. In the documents, Rear Adm. Dean Axene — who'd only transferred off Thresher less than three months before the tragedy — testified that the sub's main bal-

last tank's blow system had not enough high-pressure air and could not remove seawater quickly enough from the tank to surface from maximum depth.

"Since Thresher's total dive was much deeper than previous classes of submarines, the (court of inquiry) was surprised to find there was no sufficient effort to retest critical systems to the improved standards, especially silver brazed joints in systems seeing full submergence pressures," Bryant's report says.

And so, while the submarine may have been sunk because of a failed seawater pipe, or, as some have suggested, an electrical failure, Bryant and his team concluded that "time was not made for proper training." That could have also led to a successful recovery strategy, even if the pipe failed.

Bryant uses the example of cost overruns and other problems with the Navy's littoral class ships and the USS Gerald Ford aircraft carrier. While there have been controversies, there were no deaths. And the retired captain is prideful of the Navy's response to Thresher in developing the SUBSAFE quality assurance program.

Hyman G. Rickover, the so-called "Father of the Nuclear Navy," also testified in the inquiry, saying the loss of the Thresher was a "consequence of the philosophy on design, construction and inspection." Bryant believes Rickover may have criticized the use of a new steel on the hull, known as HY-80, as a way to steer attention away from the scrutiny of the boat's nuclear power capabilities.

Bryant said this did not come at a cost to the investigation. He points out others testified and defended the new steel. And Bryant says Rickover had good reason for steering clear of nuclear Navy issues. At the time, there were 28 nuclear submarines in the fleet and 36 more on the way, many of them carrying ballistic missiles that gave the United States a strategic advantage in the Cold War with the Soviet Union.

"Rickover did not want to say anything that might make the public and/or politicians lose faith in the safety of the nation's nuclear submarines," Bryant wrote.

Bryant said he's pushed to receive the documents so others can study them, as well as to honor the families of the fallen crew members. There are memorials around the country for Thresher; Thresher Avenue on Naval Base Kitsap-Bangor is named for the submarine.

Bryant is not done yet. The Navy is due to release more documents that will include the testimonies of other high-ranking Navy officials, as well as statements from those on the USS Skylark, a Penguin-class submarine rescue ship that accompanied the Thresher on that fateful day.

"There is more to learn," Bryant wrote in concluding his report.

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Navy announces latest ship to be christened USS Pittsburgh

A new warship will be named after Pittsburgh.

The vessel, a San Antonio-class amphibious transport dock warship used to transport landing forces, is one of five the Navy announced it names for on Friday.

"As a resident of the Keystone State, I know that Pittsburgh is a proud city with a strong legacy of service. I am confident that the crew of the future Pittsburgh will demonstrate the same excellence in support of amphibious and littoral operations around the world," Secretary of the Navy Kenneth J. Braithwaite said in a statement.

The latest USS Pittsburgh will be the fifth to be named after the Steel City.

The first vessel named after Pittsburgh was an ironclad gunboat used during the American Civil War. The second USS Pittsburgh, armored cruiser, was used during World War II and another ship, a Baltimore class cruiser, supported the landing at Iwo Jima during World War II.

The fourth USS Pittsburgh was a Los Angeles class submarine used from December 1984 to August 2019.

Another ship, a Navajo class towing, salvage and rescue ship will be named USNS Lenni Lenape to honor the Lenape Nation of Pennsylvania. This will be the first naval vessel to carry the name of the Lenni Lenape tribe who are indigenous people of Pennsylvania's northeastern woodlands, and the first tribe to sign a treaty with the United States in 1778, according to the Navy.

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
