### **Tolling of the Boats for May**

### **USS Lagarto (SS-371)**

Lost on May 3, 1945 with the loss of 86 men near the Gulf of Siam. On her 2nd war patrol, she is believed to have been lost to a radar equipped minelayer. This minelayer was sunk by the USS Hawkbill (SS-366) 2 weeks later.

### USS Scorpion (SSN-589)

USS Scorpion (SSN-589) was returning to Norfolk, VA from a Mediterranean deployment. On May 22,1968 she reported her position to be about 50 miles south of the Azores. Scorpion was never heard from again. The exact cause of her loss has never been determined. 99 officers and men were lost.

### **USS Squalus (SS-192)**

On May 23, 1939 USS Squalus suffered a catastrophic valve failure during a test dive off the Isle of Shoals. Partially flooded, the submarine sank to the bottom and came to rest keel down in 240 feet of water. Commander Charles Momsen and Navy divers on the USS Falcon (ASR-2) rescued 33survivors use the diving bell he invented. 26 men drowned in the after compartments. Later Squalus was raised and recommissioned as the USS Sailfish. In an ironic turn of fate, Sailfish sank the Japanese aircraft carrier carrying surviving crew members from Sculpin, which had located Squalus in 1939. Only one of survived after spending the rest of the war as slave laborers in Japan.

### **USS Stickleback (SS-415)**

Lost on May 28, 1958 when it sank off Hawaii while under tow after collision with USS Silverstein (DE-534). The entire crew was taken off prior to sinking.

**History of the Requin:** May 1, 1949 Requin sailed east for here first deployment with the Sixth Fleet. May 14 1949 arriving at Gibraltar, Requin operated in the Mediterranean Sea. May 2 1955 Requin sailed for her 5<sup>th</sup> Mediterranean deployment. Detached at the end of July, she returned to Norfolk VA and remained on the east coast with cruises to the Caribbean until November 1957 when she resumed duty with the Sixth Fleet. May 28 1968 Requin departed Norfolk VA as part of search efforts for the missing nuclear attack submarine Scorpion SSN-589. May 24 1990 Requin was towed to Tampa Shipyard for dry docking and hull repairs in preparation for her move to Pittsburgh PA.

**Base Commander Huey Dietrich:** Let us at this time, with a moment of silent prayer, remember our Shipmates who made the supreme sacrifice that we may gather here in Peace. We dedicate this meeting to our Shipmates on Eternal Patrol, to perpetuate their memories in our lives and to honor our Shipmates on active duty in the service of the first line of defense of our Nation.





### This month in US submarine history

#### 05/01/1943

USS Pogy (SS 266), in attack on a Japanese convoy, torpedoes and sinks the Japanese gunboat Keishin Maru off Iwaki, Japan.

### 05/02/1942

USS Drum (SS 228) sinks Japanese seaplane carrier, and USS Trout (SS 202) sinks a Japanese freighter off the southeast coast of Honshu.

#### 05/02/1945

USS Springer (SS 414) torpedoes and sinks the Japanese frigate in the Yellow Sea and then sinks a Japanese coastal defense ship the next day.

### 05/03/1942

USS Spearfish (SS 190) evacuates naval and military officers, including nurses, from Corregidor before surrendering island to Japan.

#### 05/03/2008

USS North Carolina (SSN 777) is commissioned at Port of Wilmington, N.C., before sailing for its homeport of Naval Submarine Base New London in Groton, Conn.

### 05/05/2007

USS Hawaii (SSN 776) is commissioned at Groton, Conn. The Virginia-class submarine, the first to be named after the Aloha State, arrives at its homeport of Pearl Harbor July 23, 2009 following her maiden underway period.

### 05/10/1944

USS Cod (SS 224) attacks a large Japanese convoy and destroyer off the west coast of Luzon. USS Silversides (SS 236) attacks a Japanese convoy about 120 miles south-southwest of Guam.

### 05/10/1960

USS Triton (SSRN 586), commanded by Capt. Edward L. Beach, completes a submerged circumnavigation of the world in 84 days following many of the routes taken by Magellan.

### 05/14/1944

USS Bonefish (SS 223) attacks a Japanese convoy bound for Sibitu Passage, Borneo, and sinks Japanese destroyer Inazuma near TawiTawi, east of Borneo and survives counter-attacks by Japanese destroyer Hibiki. Also on this date, USS Aspro (SS 309) and USS Bowfin (SS 287) attack a Japanese convoy and sinks cargo ship BisanMaru.

#### 05/15/1969

The pre-commissioned submarine Guitarro (SSN 665) accidentally sinks while moored at U.S. Mare Island Naval Shipyard, Calif. Due to the damage, her commissioning date is rescheduled to Sept. 1972.

#### 05/17/1942

USS Tautog (SS 199) sinks Japanese submarine I-28; USS Triton (SS 201) sinks the Japanese submarine (I 64), and USS Skipjack (SS 184) sinks a Japanese army transport ship.

### 05/20/1944

USS Angler (SS 240) sinks Japanese transport Otori Maru and survives depth charging by its escort, while both USS Silversides (SS 236) and USS Bluegill (SS 242) sink enemy vessels.

### 05/21/1983

USS Albuquerque (SSN 706) is commissioned at Submarine Base New London, Groton, Conn.



#### 05/22/1968

USS Scorpion (SSN 589) is lost with her crew south-west of the Azores. In late Oct. 1968, her remains are found on the sea floor more than 10,000 feet below the surface by a deep-submergence vehicle towed from USNS Mizar (T-AGOR-11).

#### 05/23/1939

USS Squalus (SS 192) suffers a catastrophic main induction valve failure during a test dive off the New Hampshire coast and is partially flooded, killing 26 crew members.

### 05/24/1939

Vice Adm. Allan McCann's Rescue Chamber is first used to rescue 33 men from the sunken USS Squalus (SS 192). Four Navy divers receive the Medal of Honor for their heroic actions on May 24-25 to rescue the trapped men.

#### 05/25/1944

USS Flying Fish (SS 229) attacks a Japanese convoy and sinks guardboat Daito Maru and freighter Osaka Maru north of Palau.

### 05/25/1985

USS Alabama (SSN 731) is commissioned at Naval Submarine Base New London, Conn.

#### 05/26/1943

USS Saury (SS 189) attacks a Japanese convoy south of Kyushu and sinks transport Kagi Maru, about 10 miles north of the Nansei Shoto. Also on this date, USS Whale (SS 239) sinks Japanese gunboat Shoei Maru (which is transporting men of the Guam Base Detachment) about 17 miles north-northwest of Rota, Mariana Islands.

### 05/27/1943

USS Runner (SS 275) departs Midway for her third war patrol but is never heard from again. Overdue and presumed lost in July 1943, she is struck from the Navy list that October.

### 05/28/1943

USS Peto (SS 265) sinks Japanese hydrographic-meteorological research ship Tenkai No.2 northeast of Mussau Island. Also on this date, USS Tunny (SS 282) sinks Japanese gunboat Shotoku Maru off the west coast of Rota, Mariana Islands.

### 05/28/1945

USS Ray (SS 271) sinks Japanese freighter Biko Maru northwest of Changshan. Also on this date, USS Blueback (SS 326) and USS Lamprey (SS 372) damage Japanese submarine chaser Ch1 in a surface gunnery action off Japana, N.E.I.

#### 05/29/1945

USS Sterlet (SS 392) sinks Japanese army cargo ships Kuretake Maru and Tenyro Maru despite the close proximity of the escort Coast Defense Ship No. 65.

### 05/30/1944

USS Guitarro (SS 363) sinks Japanese freighter Shisen Maru, 60 miles south-east of Keelung, Formosa. Also on this date, USS Pompon (SS 267) sinks Japanese freighter Shiga Maru off Muroto Saki, Japan while USS Rasher (SS 269) sinks the gunboat Anshu Maru about 110 miles north-northeast of Halmahera.

### 05/31/1944

USS Barb (SS 220) and USS Herring (SS 233) attack Japanese shipping in the Sea of Okhotsk about 150 miles west of Matsuwa Island, Kuril Islands, sinking several ships.

The nine-month Concept Refinement and Preliminary Design study includes options for an additional nine-month Concept Refinement and Preliminary Design update and an overarching 36-month period for special studies.

"We are excited to participate in the design study for the AS(X) submarine tender. In the coming months, we will work closely with our customer and industry partners to bring innovative solutions to advance the technology that will inform and define the future capabilities on this new class of ships."

The AS(X) will be capable of providing support and maintenance for up to four submarines, replacing the U.S. Navy's two aging tenders, the USS Emory S. Land (AS 39) and USS Frank Cable (AS 40), commissioned in 1979. The current tenders provide intermediate-level maintenance and repairs, hotel services and logistics support at sea to nuclear-powered guided missile (SSGNs) and attack submarines (SSNs) deployed in the 5th and 7th fleets areas of responsibility.

L3Harris' Herndon, Virginia, facility will perform the program management and engineering design tasks and is partnered with Philly Shipyard Inc. and VARD Inc. for design development.

### The Penobscot Expedition: The U.S. Navy's Worst Defeat Until Pearl Harbor?

Penobscot Expedition, explained: Paul Revere court-martialed? Say it ain't so! But it was. Last Tuesday marked the anniversary of the battles of Lexington and Concord, fought on April 19, 1775. Poet Henry Wadsworth Longfellow immortalized Revere's midnight ride to warn militia commanders that some 800 British regulars had marched out of Boston to seize contraband armaments secreted at Concord. A ragtag line of militiamen confronted the redcoats on Lexington Green before the shot heard 'round the world rang out during a clash between minutemen and the regulars at the North Bridge in Concord.

Thus commenced the War of American Independence.

Fast-forward to the summer of 1779 in coastal Maine, a pleasant land where I had the privilege of spending a week teaching at Maine Maritime Academy and the University of Maine earlier this month. That June a British force landed on the Penobscot Peninsula, now home to the village of <u>Castine</u>, and constructed a fort on the heights overlooking the east side of the peninsula. (It's now right across the street from the Maine Maritime campus.) The Castine Historical Society ascribes several motives to the <u>Penobscot Expedition</u>'s masterminds: they meant for Fort George to serve "as a possible Loyalist haven, as a source of timber for the King's Navy, and as a strategic naval base and coastal trading post."

Constructing a standing fortification within your enemy's territory is a time-honored troublemaking strategy, reaching all the way back to the <u>Peloponnesian War</u> and in all likelihood long before. At the time Maine remained part of Massachusetts. Alarmed at the news that redcoats had ensconced themselves in Penobscot Bay, the Massachusetts General Assembly ordered an expeditionary force fitted out to evict them from Fort George. Nineteen ships of war and 24 transports, some borrowed from the Continental Navy, carried a force numbering over 1,000 troops to Maine by July 25. The assembly entrusted Commodore Dudley Saltonstall with overall command of the expedition, while Brigadier General Solomon Lovell headed the ground contingent. Lieutenant Colonel Paul Revere oversaw the force's ordnance train.



Against the <u>Massachusetts</u> armada—the largest American naval expedition assembled during the Revolutionary War—were arrayed three Royal Navy warships, optimally placed to overshadow the confined waters beneath the fort. In other words, the balance of firepower lopsidedly favored the Americans despite the excellent British tactical position.

On July 27, 1779, Saltonstall's fleet <u>deposited</u> 227 Continental and Massachusetts marines, 850 militiamen, and 80 of Revere's artillerymen on the rugged west coast of Penobscot Peninsula. The landing force labored its way up a steep cliff, split into three groups, and moved against the fort along three different axes. Despite some success in ground combat in ensuing days, the attackers failed to dislodge the British garrison from Fort George. Lovell pled with Saltonstall to assault the Royal Navy flotilla to keep it from bombarding his landing force. But the commodore dithered rather than fight.


Delay allowed time for word of the siege to reach the British high command in New York, which promptly dispatched a seven-ship fleet to Penobscot Bay. On August 13 the relief force stood into the bay under the command of Sir George Collier. Upon sighting the British, Lovell abandoned his positions and withdrew up the Penobscot River in anticipation of a sea battle. The next morning, however, Saltonstall, who still outgunned the foe and had the British fleet under his broadside, ordered his ships—to the astonishment of Collier and Lovell—to flee up the river, and his crews to scuttle or burn their vessels. Sailors and troops scurried into the woods and back to Boston overland.

Fittingly, Dudley Saltonstall was cashiered from the service for botching the Penobscot Expedition. Paul Revere likewise faced a court-martial. Though Revere was acquitted, his reputation never recovered from the misadventure, which a placard outside Fort George today—seemingly proudly—touts as "the worst defeat in U.S. Navy history until the attack on <u>Pearl Harbor</u> in 1941." (Don't you have to fight to be defeated?) I suppose you take your historical notoriety where you find it when you're a small coastal Maine town.

What to take away from this profile in ignominy? First, pick the right leadership. Naval commanders have been called the last absolute despots on the planet, and there's truth to that. A compact unit like a ship tends to take on the personality of its skipper, as does a naval task force its admiral. Saltonstall was clearly the wrong man for the times and situation, morbidly afraid to risk his expeditionary force—and perhaps his own skin—in action against an inferior foe. Had he struck early and hard, suppressing Royal Navy gunfire and isolating Fort George, the Americans probably would have carried the day.

Second, know the terrain. The west coast of the Penobscot Peninsula makes wretched terrain for an amphibious landing. It is steep and rocky. Had the redcoats opposed the landing from atop the cliffs, pouring fire down on Lovell's troops, a bloodbath may have ensued. Dismal as the expedition's outcome was, its human cost could have been far worse. In fact, it should have been. A little net assessment goes a long way in martial undertakings.

And third, remember your defeats as well as your triumphs. I had never heard of the Penobscot Expedition before traipsing around Fort George this month. That's chiefly because the center of gravity of the Revolutionary War had <u>meandered southward</u> by the time Saltonstall, Lovell, and Revere set sail. The British Southern Campaign set the stage for the war's effective end at Yorktown, Virginia, in the fall of 1781. That theater dominates the history books. But you have to think the assault on Fort George would not be lost to memory were it a tale of heroic feats of arms rather than a disgrace. It's natural to celebrate the deeds of a <u>Nathanael Greene</u>, who ran Lord Cornwallis' redcoats ragged in the South; but you can learn just as much, albeit in a negative sense, from studying the misdeeds of a Dudley Saltonstall.

And humility and introspection are invaluable.
