

Tolling of the Boats for December

USS Capelin (SS-289)

Lost on Dec 2, 1943 with the loss of 76 men. She was on her 1st war patrol, but her exact location, date and cause of loss remain a mystery. She may have been lost to mines or an operational casualty.

USS Sealion (SS-195)

Lost on Dec 10, 1941 with the loss of 4 men. To prevent her from falling into enemy hands, she was scuttled in Manila Bay after incurring severe bomb damage during the initial Japanese attack. One other Sealion man was later captured and died in POW camp.

USS F-1 / Carp (SS-20)

Lost on December 17, 1917 with the loss of 19 officers and men when it was sunk after collision with the USS F-3 (Pickerel(SS-22)) off San Clemente, CA.

<u>USS S-4 (SS-109)</u>

Lost on December 17, 1927 with the loss of 40 officers and men when it was sunk after being rammed by USCG Paulding. Salvaged in 1928 and recommissioned.

Requin History On December 1, 1948, the USS Requin left shipyard with new radar equipment and reported to New London CT for duty in Submarine Squadron 8. On December 3, 1968, USS Requin was decommissioned and on December 20, 1971, USS Requin was struck from the Navy Register.

LT Will Kinsley was born and raised in Littleton, CO and proceeded out of state to attend college at Auburn University on a NROTC Scholarship. Graduating in 2017 with a degree in Mechanical Engineering, he commissioned and reported to NNPTC at the end of the same year. After completing the nuclear officer training pipeline, he reported to the USS Louisville (SSN 724) in early 2019 and completed her home port shift and decommissioning as the RCA and CRA. During this time, he rode the USS Connecticut (SSN 22) for ICEX 2020 and completion of his submarine qualification. He spilt-toured to USS Oklahoma City (SSN 723) out of Guam at the completion of Lady Lou's decommissioning in 2021, relieving as the AWEPs prior to OKCs final WEST-PAC deployment.

LT Kinsley transferred off OKC following her home port shift to Bremerton for decommissioning and reported to NAVSUBSCOL as a Tactics Instructor in early 2022. After two years as an instructor, he switched from behind the podium to in front of it as a SOAC student. Upon completion of SOAC, he has orders to relieve as WEPs onboard USS Virginia (SSN 774).

In the "Believe it or Not" category, LT Will Kinsley is the husband of LT Megan Kinsley who was the first recipient of the Mush Morton award. LT Will Kinsley worked with CDR Andy McGovern and USS Requin base in the development of the Mush Morton Award. 



USS Bonefish (SS 223) sinks Japanese transport Nichiryo Maru in the Celebes Sea while USS Pargo (SS 264) sinks the Japanese transport Shoko Maru north of Ulithi. Also on this date, USS Peto (SS 265) sinks Japanese transport Tonei Maru.

12/02/1944

USS Sea Devil (SS 400) attacks a Japanese convoy in the East China Sea and sinks merchant tanker Akigawa Maru and passenger-cargo ship Hawaii Maru, while USS Gunnel (SS 253) evacuates 11 rescued aviators from Palawan, Philippines and turns over all available stores to Filipino forces ashore.

12/03/1943

USS Tinosa (SS 283) sinks the Palau-bound Japanese fleet tanker Azuma Maru northwest of Sonsorol.

12/04/1944

USS Flasher (SS 249) sinks Japanese destroyer Kishinami and damages a merchant ship in the South China Sea. Flasher is the only U.S. submarine to sink more than 100,000 tons of enemy shipping in World War II.

12/05/1943

USS Narwhal (SS 167) embarks nine evacuees at Alubijid, Mascalar Bay and then sinks Japanese cargo ship Himeno Maru off Camiguin Island.

12/05/1944

USS Hake (SS 256) evacuates downed aviators and turns over all supplies that can be spared to Filippino guerilla forces ashore at Libertad, Panay, Philippines.

12/08/1943

USS Sawfish (SS 276) sinks Japanese transport Sansei Maru southeast of Chi Chi Jima. Also on this date, TBFs sinks Rabaul-bound fishing boats No. 3 Yusho Maru, No.7 Fukuri Maru, No.2 Takatori Maru, and No.1 Hoko Maru.

12/09/1941

USS Swordfish (SS 193) makes initial U.S. submarine attack on Japanese ship, torpedoing a ship 150 miles west of Manila. Her claim of sinking, though, is not confirmed in enemy records.

12/10/1982

The nuclear powered USS Ohio (SSBN 726), first Trident-Class submarine, returns from its first deterrent patrol.

12/11/1944

USS Gar (SS 206) lands 35 tons of supplies at Darigayos Inlet on the west coast of Luzon and picks up secret intelligence documents. Also on this date, USS Sea Owl (SS 405) sinks Japanese auxiliary submarine chaser Cha 76 in the East China Sea.

12/13/1943

USS Sailfish (SS 192) sinks Japanese cargo ship Totai Maru east of Tokara Strait while PBY aircraft sink Tokiwa Maru in the Bismarck Sea.

12/15/1944

USS Hawkbill (SS 366) sinks the Japanese destroyer Momo west of Luzon.

12/16/1944

USS Swordfish (SS 193) attacks a Japanese convoy south of Hainan Island and sinks Japanese army transport Atsutasan Maru.

12/17/1942

USS Grouper (SS 214) sinks the Japanese army passenger cargo ship Bandoeng Maru about 15 miles northwest of Cape Henpan, Buka Island, Solomons and survives the counterattack by submarine chaser Ch 29.

12/18/1943

USS Aspro (SS 309) attacks a Japanese convoy in Sakishima Gunto, damaging fleet tankers Sarawak Maru and Tenei Maru, and escapes counter attacks by destroyer Shoikaze. Meanwhile, USS Grayback (SS 208) sinks Japanese freighter Gyokurei Maru east-northeast of Naha, Okinawa and escapes counter attacks by destroyer Numakaze.

12/19/1943

USS Grayback (SS 208) sinks the Japanese destroyer Numakaze 50 miles east-northeast of Naha, Okinawa.

12/19/1944

USS Redfish (SS 395) sinks the Japanese carrier Unryu 200 nautical miles southeast of Shanghai, China. In the course of this engagement, Redfish is damaged and terminates her patrol early.

12/21/1942

USS Seadragon (SS 194) sinks Japanese submarine I-4 between New Britain and New Ireland while I-4 is engaged in a resupply mission to Guadalcanal.

12/22/1942

On board USS Silversides (SS 236), Pharmacists Mate 1st Class Thomas A. Moore performs an emergency appendectomy on Fireman 3rd Class George M. Platter while the submarine is submerged and on war patrol in the Solomon Islands. Platter returned to duty within a few days of the operation.

12/23/1944

USS Blenny (SS 324), despite an escort vessel close by, sinks the Japanese merchant tanker Kenzui Maru off San Fernando, Luzon, Philippines.

12/25/1944

USS Barbero (SS 317) attacks a Japanese convoy and sinks transport Junpo Maru.

12/27/1943

USS Flying Fish (SS 229) sinks the Japanese fleet tanker Kyuei Maru in the South China Sea west of Luzon Strait. Also on this date, USS Ray (SS 271) sinks the Japanese fleet tanker Kyoko Maru (ex-Dutch Semiramis) west of the Celebes.

12/29/1943

USS Silversides (SS 236) sinks the Japanese transport Tenposan Maru, the army cargo ship Shichisei Maru, and the freighter Ryuto Maru while also damaging the army cargo ship Bichu Maru off Palau.

12/30/1942

USS Greenling (SS 213) attacks a Japanese convoy 180 miles northeast of Manus, Admiralty Islands and sinks Army cargo ship Hiteru Maru and damages cargo ship Ryufuku Maru while USS Thresher (SS 200) sinks the Japanese freighter Haichan Maru west of Mata Siri Island, off the southern tip of Borneo.

12/30/1943

USS Bluefish (SS 222) sinks Japanese oiler Ichiyu Maru in the Java Sea.

12/30/1944

USS Razorback (SS 394) attacks a Japanese convoy going from Manila to Takao, about 60 miles southeast of Formosa, and sinks the destroyer Kuretake in the Bashi Channel. The Japanese cargo ships Brazil Maru and Oi Maru are also damaged during this attack.

12/30/1959

The first fleet ballistic missile submarine, USS George Washington (SSBN 598), is commissioned.

Congress Is Putting More Money into These Submarines in New Spending Bill

With Russia's recent use of a hypersonic missile alarming U.S. military planners, Congress is putting more money into submarine power and by extension keeping General Dynamics Electric Boat shipyard busy as it faces tight delivery windows for two major sub programs.

The National Defense Authorization Act passed by the U.S. House of Representatives included an expected increase in funding to support construction of a new fleet of ballistic missile submarines, and an unexpected boost for future attack submarine construction. Electric Boat has its main shipyard in Groton, an engineering office in <u>New London</u>, and an auxiliary shipyard in Rhode Island that barges components to Groton for final assembly.

The defense bill also includes a 14.5% increase in pay for junior enlisted members of the military, as ser-

vice branches amp up <u>recruiting</u> to fill a gap in projected force numbers. About 14,500 active-duty service members were stationed in Connecticut at last report, the large majority in Groton at <u>Naval Submarine</u> <u>Base New London</u>.

U.S. Rep. John Larson, D-1st, was the lone member of Connecticut's Congressional delegation to vote against the bill in its current form. In response to a CT Insider query, Larson indicated he balked at an element that would ban insurance coverage for gender-affirming care for children in military families. Larson called it "a difficult vote" that ran counter to his support of defense spending bills in prior years.

"The NDAA contained important wins for our service members and Connecticut jobs," Larson stated in an email response forwarded by an office staff member. "It was shameful for Republican leadership to disrupt the bipartisan process of passing a defense authorization bill to insert a provision to ban gender affirming care for service members' children. Health care decisions need to be made by families and medical professionals, not politicians."

U.S. Sen. Richard Blumenthal, D-Connecticut, a member of the U.S. Senate Committee on Armed Services, indicated he will vote in favor of the bill in its current form.

"I regret some of the provisions in the bill -- including limitations on health care for the families of military personnel -- and am talking to my colleagues about opportunities to change them," Blumenthal said in an email forwarded by staff.

U.S. Sen. Chris Murphy, D-Connecticut, declined comment on the bill in advance of an expected Senate vote sometime next week, according to a spokesperson in Murphy's office.

Columbia Sub a Priority

A CT Insider analysis of line items for major military systems made in Connecticut shows \$35.6 billion in total spending, down slightly from \$36 billion a year earlier, including for fighter jets that use engines from Pratt & Whitney based in East Hartford. Those figures do not include additional revenue from Connecticut-based companies that provide subsystems for installation in major Pentagon programs, which are not easily identifiable by line item.

At least \$19.2 billion will support submarine construction at General Dynamics Electric Boat as well as the Huntington Ingalls Industries Newport News shipyard in Virginia, or systems that go into new and existing submarines. That includes procurement of materials and systems for subs that will be assembled later, some supplied by companies based in other states.

While Congress is ordering one fewer <u>Virginia-class</u> sub amid ongoing struggles by Electric Boat and Newport News to obtain parts from suppliers who have experienced labor shortages since the COVID-19 pandemic, that is more than offset by an extra \$3.8 billion for the new Columbia class of attack submarines.

U.S. Rep. Joe Courtney, D-2nd, supported the bill despite Congress eliminating one Virginia-class sub from the program. He serves as the ranking member of the Seapower and Projection Forces Subcommittee of the House Armed Services Committee.

The program is getting an extra boost of \$357 million to support the purchase of systems for future subs, which was not included in the Pentagon's original funding request. Last week, Electric Boat reported the successful completion of sea trials for the USS Iowa, the 24th sub in the Virginia-class fleet stationed currently at Naval Submarine Base New London, which is to be commissioned next spring.

The <u>Navy</u> is putting increased emphasis on submarine power as concerns grow over potential vulnerabilities of surface ships to drone or missile attacks. This fall, Russian forces fired a hypersonic missile at a Ukraine target that traveled more than 10 times the speed of sound, representing a formidable challenge for shipboard defense systems given the velocity and maneuverability of hypersonic missiles.

Missile Development, Fighter Jets

In the defense bill for fiscal 2025, Congress approved \$2.1 billion for hypersonic missile development and procurement, with Lockheed Martin and Raytheon among the companies developing missiles.


Under the current version of the bill, Congress would authorize the purchase of 20 fewer F-35 Lighting II fighter jets from Lockheed Martin than the 68 aircraft the Department of Defense had requested.

The F-35 Lighting II uses the F135 jet engine made by Pratt & Whitney in East Hartford, with U.S. Rep. Rosa DeLauro stating the fiscal 2025 bill includes \$537 million to support F135 upgrades by Pratt & Whitney.

The lower purchase volume is a setback for Pratt & Whitney and parent Raytheon, however, which have been scrambling since last year to complete a recall of commercial jet engines. The recall has forced airlines to ground planes for more than a year as engines are removed from wings for repair.

Another \$2.1 billion is earmarked for 20 new CH-53K King Stallion cargo helicopters built in Stratford for the U.S. <u>Marine Corps</u> by the Sikorsky subsidiary of Lockheed Martin, and \$707 million will go for two dozen Sikorsky <u>Black Hawk</u> helicopters for the U.S. <u>Army</u>. Overall Black Hawk funding is down for the 2025 fiscal year due to the Army scrapping a program to modernize some of its older helicopters.

The bill cuts by \$15 million the allocation for the Sikorsky Jolly Green II rescue helicopter for the U.S. <u>Air</u> <u>Force</u>, for a fiscal 2025 appropriation of just under \$148 million.



Navy Bases Virginia-class Attack Boat in Guam

Naval Base Guam received the USS *Minnesota* (SSN-783) on Tuesday, marking the first forward deployment of a Virginia-class nuclear attack submarine to the strategically positioned American territory in the Indo-Pacific.

Minnesota's arrival is part of the Navy's "strategic laydown plan" across the region, which will see the service "station the most capable units forward."

"This posture allows flexibility for maritime and joint force operations, with forward-deployed units ready to rapidly respond to deter aggression and promote a peaceful and prosperous Indo-Pacific region," reads a Navy press release.

The Virginia class joins four older Los Angeles-class nuclear fast attack boats — USS *Asheville* (SSN-758), USS *Jefferson City* (SSN-759), USS *Annapolis* (SSN-760) and USS *Springfield* (SSN-761) — in Submarine Squadron 15 at Naval Base Guam. Guam is also the home port of the Navy's only submarine tenders,

USS *Emory S. Land* (AS-39) and USS *Frank Cable* (AS-40). Plans to increase the base's submarine maintenance and training capabilities were announced two years ago in an attempt by the service to hedge against the numerically superior People's Liberation Army Navy fleet. The Navy described the presence of these submarines as the "tip of the spear."

"Minnesota is composed of exemplary individuals who represent some of our brightest sailors in the Fleet. They're eager to get out into the local community and stand ready to contribute to our strategic objectives and maintain warfighting readiness in the Pacific," Cmdr. Isaac Pelt, commanding officer of the *Minnesota*, said in a press release.

Guam's importance in American force posture in the Indo-Pacific has been highlighted in recent years with calls for more basing and air defenses on the strategic island. Anderson Air Base has long acted as a hub for American aerial operations across the region. Marine Corps Base Camp Blaz was activated last January and is set to host 5,000 Marines in the coming years.

In order to protect these installations from air and missile threats, particularly from China and North Korea, an advanced air defense network, dubbed the Guam Defense System, is slated to be completed in the 2030s and provide 360-degree coverage of the island.



UPDATED: OMB Pitches \$7.3B in Additional Funds for Columbia, Virginia Sub Construction

The White House asked Congress on Monday for \$7.3 billion split across two requests for additional funds for the Navy to pay for Columbia and Virginia-class submarines, USNI News has learned.

According to a senior Navy official, the White House Office of Management and Budget is asking Congress for an additional \$5.69 billion to pay for cost overages on three Virginia-class submarines and workforce development at General Dynamics Electric Boat and HII's Newport News Shipbuilding. In a separate ask, OMB wants Congress to fund \$1.59 billion to keep Columbia-class nuclear ballistic missile submarine construction on track during the current stop-gap federal funding bill, which expires in about a month.

The \$5.69 request is an "emergency appropriations ... that's designed to address shortfalls in our Virginiaclass fast attack submarine program," a senior Navy official told reporters on Monday.

"Our Virginia-class fast attack submarine program is not where it needs to be right now, the program and the shipyards are not producing submarines at the rate that our national security strategy and the national defense strategy require."

Currently, the yards deliver Virginias at a rate of 1.3 boats per year – far short of the two-per-year cadence the Navy needs to meet its national security goals and the 2.33 rate it needs to meet the commitment to the AUKUS Pillar 1 agreement between the U.S., Australia and the U.K., that will provide the Royal Australian Navy with three to four Virginia-class boats.

The \$5.69 Virginia emergency funding request includes:

- \$1.95 billion to cover the unplanned cost increases for Block V attack boats *Baltimore* (SSN-812) and *Atlanta* (SSN-813) over the \$9.5 billion already appropriated.
- \$1.53 billion over the \$7.3 billion Fiscal Year 2025 request for the first Block VI Virginia boat.
- \$518 million for "wage productivity enhancements" at Electric Boat and Newport News.

\$1.95 billion for "other productivity enhancements" at the two yards. Additionally, the request includes a legislative proposal for the Navy to directly support wages at the two nuclear yards in the future.

The OMB request for emergency funding comes as the Navy and the White House have distanced themselves from a competing proposal that would allow EB and Newport News to access money that has been appropriated for submarines not-yet under construction. The proposal, also created by the Navy but then abandoned, would pay for current cost gaps in wages and improve infrastructure as part of the negotiations for 17 submarines the service wanted to get under contract this year.

The Shipbuilder Accountability and Workforce Support, or SAWS plan, as a means to ease the spike in worker wages following the COVID-19 pandemic OMB elected not to use the plan and offered up its expanded supplemental instead.

"We believe [OMB's] proposal offers the best way forward to improve shipyard performance while allowing the executive and legislative branch to direct this money where it will go and hold ourselves accountable based on the metrics that we've been using with Congress," the senior official said. "There are no easy solutions."

The current OMB proposal and competing SAWS funding model are acknowledgments of the more than 20 percent increase in workforce cost since the Block V Virginia-class multi-year submarine contract. SAWS would have created a pool of about \$10 billion for the shipyards to use as they needed for workforce development and infrastructure, several sources familiar with the proposal have told USNI News.

Creating that pool of funds under SAWS was part of larger contract negotiations for 17 total submarines between EB, Newport News and the Navy. Those included *Baltimore*, *Atlanta*,9 to 10 Block VI boats and five Build II Columbia-class submarines.

OMB elected to go with an incremental funding approach focusing on the three Virginias and then wants to wait and see.

"We're trying to make targeted investments based on our conversations with industry that will address the most acute pain points, and then see if those investments have, in fact, generated the return," the official said.

"This is not about addressing a challenge associated with 17 boats. This is about putting in place productivity enhancements that can make the two yards more productive, while ... addressing the challenges that are closest to our current fiscal cycle."

Both EB and HII previously expected to sign the contracts for the 17 boats by the end of this calendar year,

but revised their revenue targets to reflect the stalled negotiations. HII, which doesn't have the diversified portfolio that General Dynamics has, saw a stock drop of more than 20 percent when it revised the revenue targets.

A spokesperson with EB declined to comment on the OMB proposal.

In a Monday statement to USNI News, HII's CEO Chris Kastner defended the SAWS proposal over the OMB supplemental pitch.

"A piecemeal approach will not yield the sustained production rate increases required a) to complete current construction contracts that pre-date the pandemic, and b) to meet the generational increase in the demand for submarines," reads the statement.

"By annualizing support services using funds already within the Navy's current FYDP – ie, requiring no new appropriations unlike OMB alternative – SAWS recognizes the underlying realities: a tight fiscal environment, inflation, increased wage expectations for skilled labor, and extended supplier lead times... We look forward to resolving these challenges with the Navy, through SAWS or a comparable alternative."

Following an earlier version of this post, Rep. Joe Courtney (D-Conn.) told USNI News the OMB proposal was a late recognition of Navy funding shortfalls in the Fiscal Year 2025 budget.

"The Navy's request is a belated recognition of short-term funding shortfalls in the Virginia program that its original 2025 budget omitted. This delay has also impeded the completion of a new contract for 17 submarines that is 18 months overdue," Courtney said.
